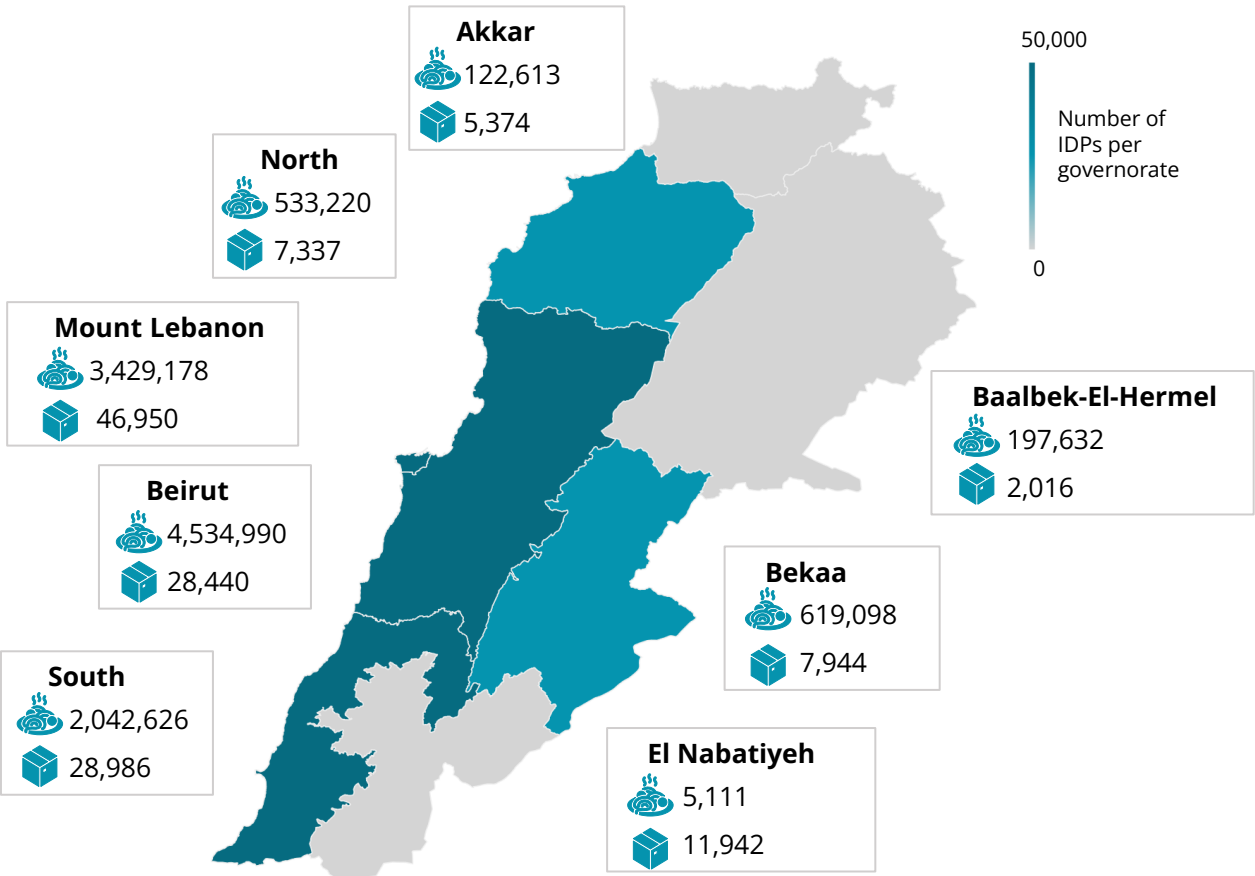

The map below shows the cumulative distribution of hot and cold meals, as well as ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance, across the different governorates.



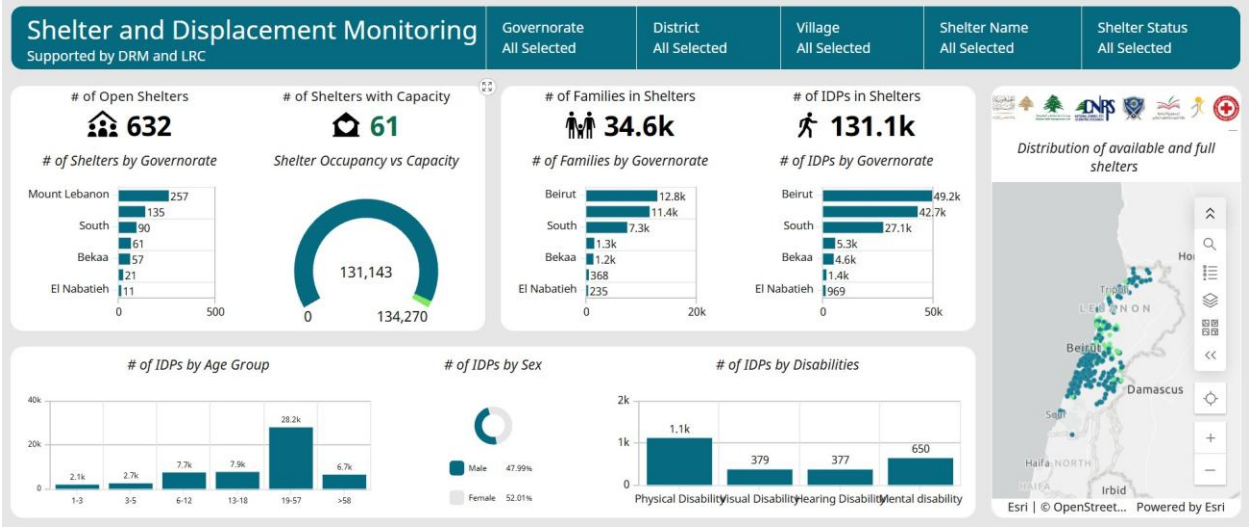

Ongoing airstrikes across the Nabatiyeh and South Lebanon governorates continue to result in civilian casualties and significant displacement. Simultaneously, heightened threats of airstrikes targeting Beirut's Southern Suburbs have triggered a new wave of population movements, further straining existing shelter capacity. As a result, collective shelters are becoming increasingly overcrowded, exacerbating humanitarian needs. Against this backdrop, demand for assistance is rapidly escalating, while critical funding shortfalls persist, posing a significant challenge to the sustained provision of adequate and timely food assistance to affected populations residing in shelters. More than one million people are currently displaced nationwide, including over 131,100 in 632 collective shelters.

According to the latest Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) projections, an estimated 1.24 million people are expected to face high levels of acute food insecurity (IPC Phase 3 or above) between April and August 2026. This deterioration is driven by continued conflict and displacement, loss of livelihoods, disruptions to local markets in affected areas, rising food and fuel prices, and a projected decline in humanitarian food assistance coverage.

SHELTER RESPONSE OVERVIEW

All collective shelters are currently covered by Food Security Sector partners through the provision of hot meals and ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance. However, two shelters in the Nabatieh governorate—Rmeish and Zefta—remain inaccessible due to prevailing security constraints and are therefore supported exclusively through the distribution of RTEs.

Key Updates

- 1) The community kitchen approach continues to be prioritized in shelters where assessments have been cleared by MEHE's Engineering Department. Current implementation efforts are focused on shelters and schools in Saida and Mount Lebanon.
- 2) Bread distribution activities are being scaled up in coordination with the Ministry of Economy and the Union of Bakeries. Through Food Security and Agriculture (FSA) sector partners, approximately 12,000 bread bundles are being distributed daily across shelters in Lebanon.
- 3) For hard-to-reach areas, the sector continues to prioritize needs assessments, facilitate partner engagement, and coordinate closely with the Logistics Cluster to ensure service delivery. With the recent influx of displaced populations, Saida has been identified as a priority area, and a request has been received from the Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) authorities to support internally displaced persons (IDPs) residing outside formal shelter facilities.
- 4) Additionally, to support access to hard-to-reach areas in south Lebanon, convoys that consist of food and lifesaving assistance were coordinated with WFP and the Logistics Cluster. This week's planned movements include a convoy to Sarba, Nabatieh on Tuesday 2 June and a convoy to Tyre on Thursday 4 June.
