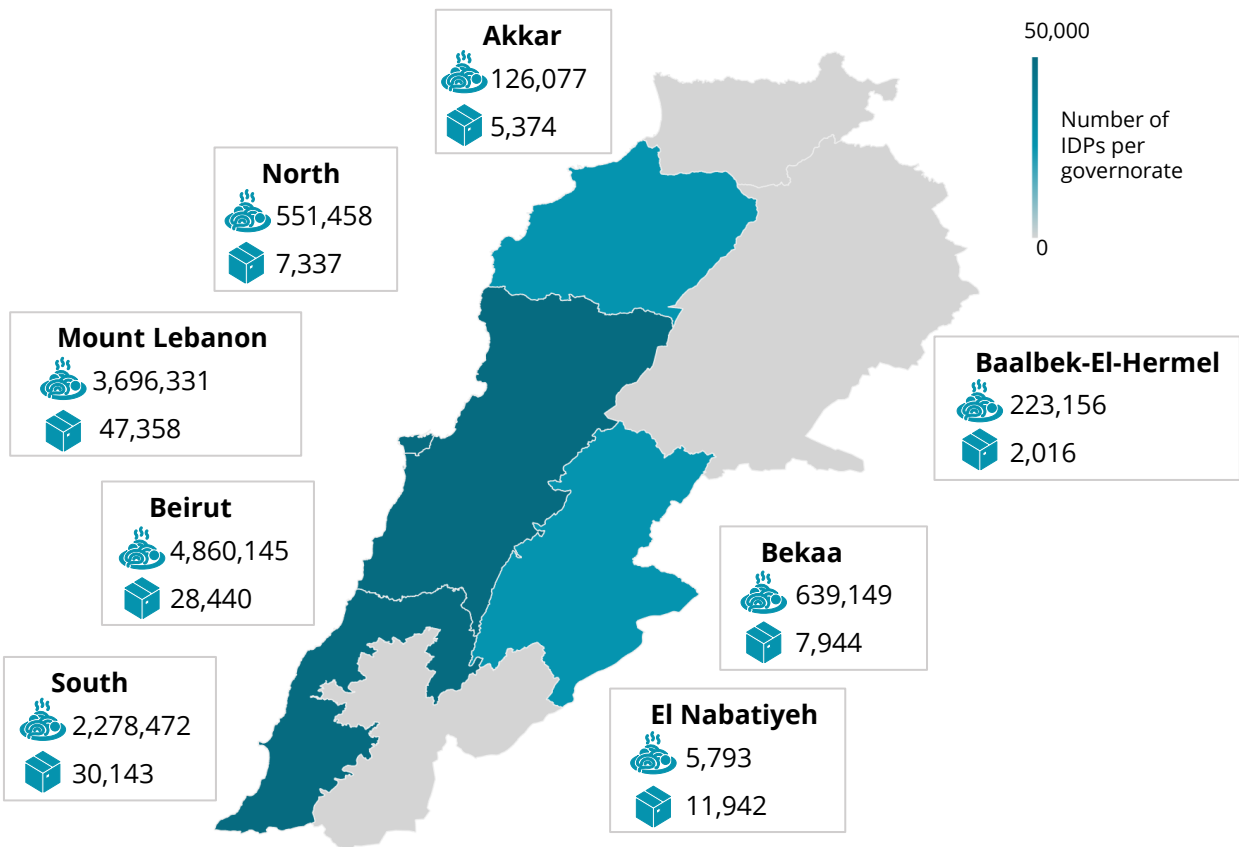

The map below shows the cumulative distribution of hot and cold meals, as well as ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance, across the different governorates.



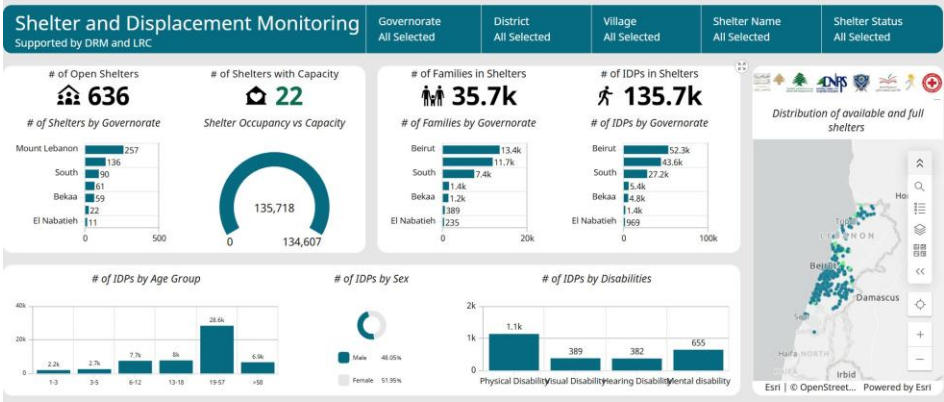

Lebanon experienced a major new wave of displacement on June 1, driven by intensified military operations in South Lebanon and Nabatieh governorates. The Lebanese Red Cross (LRC) reported an approximate of 30,000 families fleeing South Governorate, while an additional 4,000 families departed from Nabatieh Governorate on the 1st of June. Beirut Southern Suburbs also saw massive displacement, with preliminary estimates of around 50,000 families, marking one of the largest single displacement events of the current escalation.

The intensity of airstrikes in Tyre, Nabatiyeh, and southern Lebanon has increased significantly over the past week, leading to daily displacement from surrounding villages toward Tyre and Saida. A large proportion of displaced individuals are not relocating to shelters, instead remaining in temporary situations, including staying in vehicles, along coastal areas, or in open spaces while awaiting further developments. This dynamic and fluid pattern of displacement is creating additional challenges for the delivery of consistent and effective humanitarian response.

The needs within collective shelters continue to increase, requiring food assistance to meet the minimum caloric intake per displaced person. Due to the reduction in available resources, approximately 80 percent of shelters are currently providing only one hot meal per day, typically covering lunch, with additional ready-to-eat (RTE) items distributed when available. However, partners do not have the capacity to ensure regular weekly RTE distributions as per the recommended guidance. This represents a critical gap in both resources and operational capacity, which the sector is actively flagging to donors, as minimum food security requirements are not being met as of June 2026 for around 80 percent of IDPs across all shelters.

SHELTER RESPONSE OVERVIEW

All collective shelters are currently covered by Food Security Sector partners through the provision of hot meals and ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance. However, two shelters in the Nabatieh governorate—Rmeish and Zefta—remain inaccessible due to prevailing security constraints and are therefore supported exclusively through the distribution of RTEs.

Key Updates

- 1) Bread distribution activities are ongoing in close coordination with the Ministry of Economy and the Union of Bakeries. Through Food Security and Agriculture (FSA) Sector partners, approximately **12,000 bread bundles** are distributed **daily** across collective shelters nationwide. **Since mid-April, around 126,300 bread bundles have been delivered across Lebanon.** In Beirut, the Union of Bakeries facilitates direct delivery to shelters in coordination with FSA partners.
- 2) To address the needs of vulnerable populations outside collective shelters—particularly those not receiving cash assistance and residing in areas with limited market functionality—food parcel distributions were initiated at the request of the Governors of Beirut and Mount Lebanon. Identified **needs in Beirut total 25,000 parcels** and are fully covered through planned distributions by WFP (20,000) and FSA partners (5,000) with 4,102 already distributed by Care and Islamic Relief. Similarly, **in the Southern Suburbs (Dahye), the requirement of 30,000 parcels** is being met through WFP's planned 20,000 distributions, alongside 7,455 already distributed by Care, ACF and Nusaned and an additional 3,000 planned by CARE, leaving no identified gap.
- 3) For hard-to-reach areas, the sector continues to prioritize needs assessments, facilitate partner engagement, and coordinate closely with the Logistics Cluster to ensure service delivery. With the recent influx of displaced populations, **Saida has been identified as a priority area**, and a request has been received from the Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) authorities to **support internally displaced persons (IDPs) residing outside formal shelter** facilities.
- 4) Additionally, to support access to hard-to-reach areas in south Lebanon, convoys that consist of food and lifesaving assistance were coordinated with WFP and the Logistics Cluster. Next week's planned movements include **a convoy on Tuesday 9 June to Saida, a convoy to Rmeish on Thursday 11 June** and **a convoy to Borj el Moulouk on Friday 12 June.**
