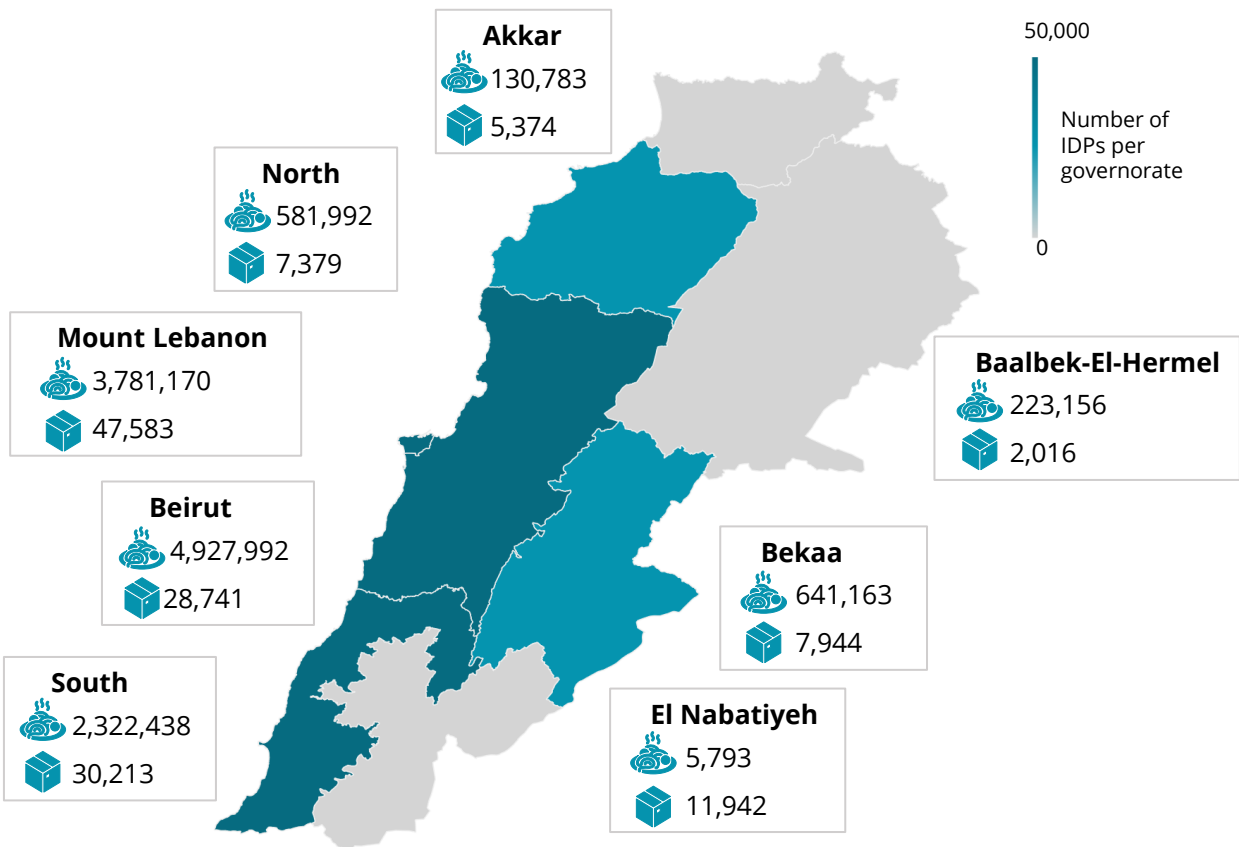

The map below shows the cumulative distribution of hot and cold meals, as well as ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance, across the different governorates.



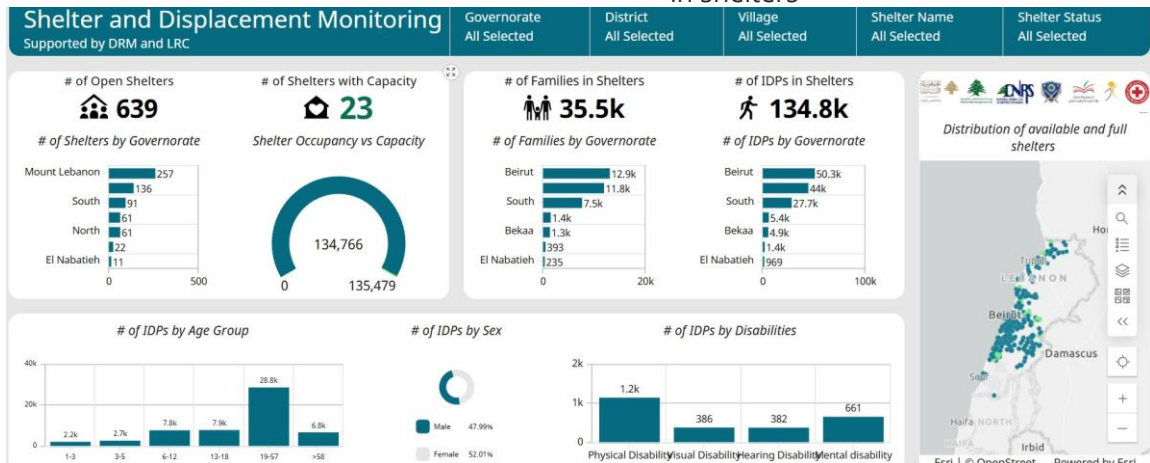

Despite the joint ceasefire announcement by Lebanon, Israel, and the United States, the security context remained highly unstable during the reporting period, with ongoing hostilities continuing to drive displacement and intensify humanitarian needs. Multiple displacement orders issued or reactivated across South and Nabatieh governorates—including instructions for civilians to relocate north of the Zahrani River—have prompted further population movements, placing significant strain on already overstretched shelter systems and host communities. The situation further deteriorated on 7 June, when Beirut’s southern suburbs were once again subjected to airstrikes, triggering renewed displacement and heightened panic among already vulnerable populations.

As of 8 June, an estimated 134,800 individuals were accommodated across 639 increasingly congested collective shelters, while many thousands of families continue to reside in informal or open-air settings due to limited capacity. Shelter infrastructure in key locations—particularly in Tyre and Saida—has reportedly reached saturation point, underscoring the severity of current displacement pressures and the urgent need to scale up humanitarian response efforts.

The needs within collective shelters continue to increase, requiring food assistance to meet the minimum caloric intake per displaced person. Due to the reduction in available resources, approximately 80 percent of shelters are currently providing only one hot meal per day, typically covering lunch, with additional ready-to-eat (RTE) items distributed when available. However, partners do not have the capacity to ensure regular weekly RTE distributions as per the recommended guidance. This represents a critical gap in both resources and operational capacity, which the sector is actively flagging to donors, as minimum food security requirements are not being met as of June 2026 for around 80 percent of IDPs across all shelters.

SHELTER RESPONSE OVERVIEW

All collective shelters are currently covered by Food Security Sector partners through the provision of hot meals and ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance.

Key Updates

On 5 June 2026, the Prime Minister, the Minister of Social Affairs, and the Humanitarian Coordinator for Lebanon jointly launched a revised Flash Appeal seeking US\$639.9 million to provide life-saving assistance to 1.4 million people in need. Within this framework, the Food Security and Agriculture (FSA) sector appeals for US\$120.7 million to sustain and scale up response activities between June and August, contributing to the overall funding requirements for the March–August 2026 period.

Regional Updates

North and Akkar

- Due to the recent increase in displacement towards Akkar, two additional shelters were opened over the past two days. Across both regions, all shelters are receiving daily lunch meals provided by partners including WFP/Caritas, WFP/TVET, OOM, Khotat Al Ihsan, UNRWA/WPA, IOCC, RMF, and PCPM. A second meal is being provided in a limited number of locations, covering 23 shelters in the North and 1 shelter in Akkar.
- Despite the steady progress, a gap in RTE assistance is anticipated starting mid-June based on the current pipeline, with an expected shortfall of 700 RTEs in the North and 384 RTEs in Akkar.

Beirut and Mount Lebanon

- Lunch meal provision has been successfully established across most collective shelters. However, significant gaps persist in the provision of ready-to-eat (RTE) assistance, with current operational capacity insufficient to ensure comprehensive coverage across all shelter sites.
- The delivery of assistance outside collective shelters has been initiated in both Beirut and Mount Lebanon. Current coverage targets are set at 25,000 households in Beirut and 30,000 households in Mount Lebanon, reflecting a phased scale-up of support to affected populations outside formal shelter settings.

South Lebanon

- To support access to hard-to-reach areas in south Lebanon, convoys that consist of food and lifesaving assistance were coordinated with WFP and the Logistics Cluster. This week's planned movements include a convoy on Tuesday 9 June to Sarba, a convoy to Rmeish on Thursday 11 June and a convoy to Borj el Moulouk on Friday 12 June.
