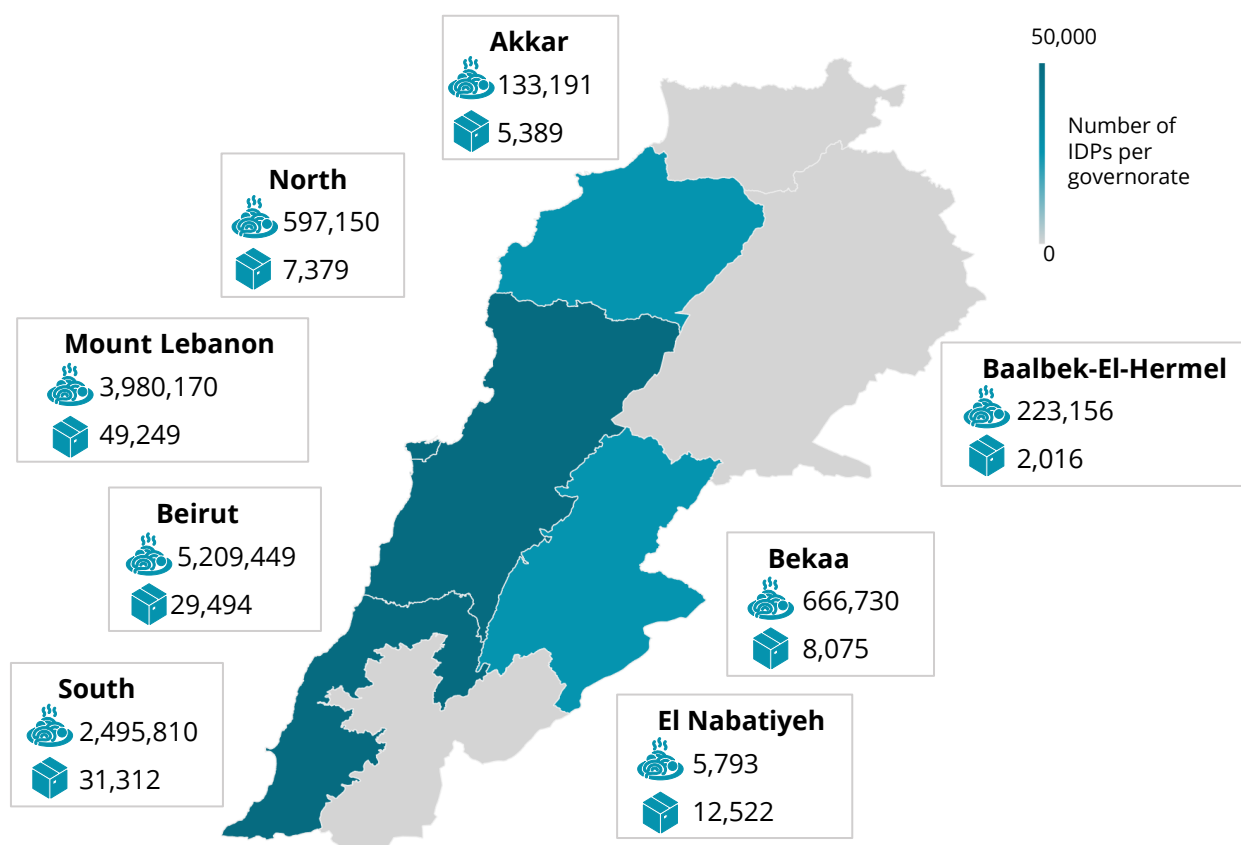

The map below shows the cumulative distribution of hot and cold meals, as well as ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance, across the different governorates.



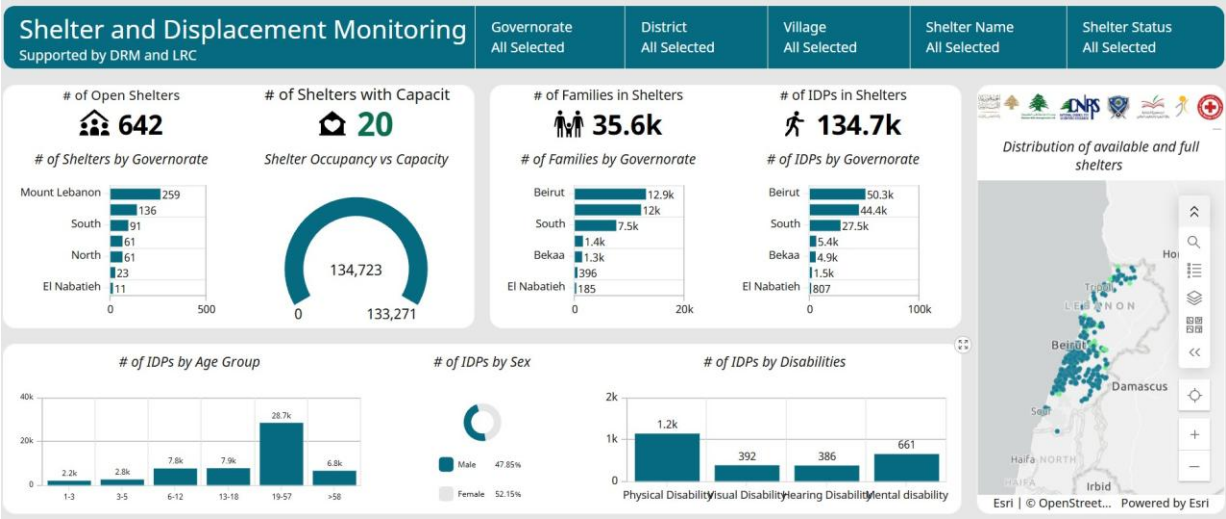

The Lebanese Red Cross reported a marked escalation in displacement on 7 June following airstrikes targeting Beirut’s southern suburbs. Preliminary estimates suggest that around 50,000 families, or approximately 200,000 individuals, have been displaced from Beirut’s southern suburbs, significantly exacerbating the scale of population movements. In addition, approximately 4,000 families fled Nabatieh Governorate, while an estimated 30,000 families—representing around 85 per cent of those previously remaining in the South Governorate—were forced to leave their locations of displacement.

Collective shelter capacity in Beirut, Tyre, and Saida has now been fully exhausted, necessitating the redirection of newly displaced households toward the North Governorate, which has become the primary destination for onward displacement. In response to the sustained influx, authorities in both Beirut and northern Lebanon are actively exploring the establishment of temporary tented settlements to accommodate continued arrivals and alleviate pressure on existing infrastructure.

As of 11 June, an estimated 134,700 individuals were accommodated across 642 increasingly congested collective shelters, while many thousands of families continue to reside in informal or open-air settings due to limited capacity. Shelter infrastructure in key locations—particularly in Tyre and Saida—has reportedly reached saturation point, underscoring the severity of current displacement pressures and the urgent need to scale up humanitarian response efforts.

Key Updates

Regional Updates

North and Akkar

- Due to the recent increase in displacement towards Akkar, two additional shelters were opened over the past week. Across both regions, all shelters are receiving daily lunch meals. A second meal is being provided in a limited number of locations, covering 23 shelters in the North and 1 shelter in Akkar.
- Despite the steady progress, a gap in RTE assistance is anticipated starting mid-June based on the current pipeline, with an expected shortfall of 700 RTEs in the North and 384 RTEs in Akkar.

Bekaa and Baalbek-El Hermel

- Shelters across Bekaa and Baalbek-El Hermel governorates are currently receiving full coverage of daily hot meal distributions. In addition, a second daily meal is being provided, with 14 shelters benefiting from breakfast distributions, while the remaining sites are supported through ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance.

Beirut and Mount Lebanon

- The distribution of food parcels to populations outside collective shelters is ongoing, in close coordination with relevant authorities. Lunch meal provision has been successfully established across the majority of shelters.
- With rising temperatures, feedback has been received from internally displaced persons (IDPs) regarding difficulties in consuming very hot meals. The sector is actively exploring mitigation measures to adapt food assistance modalities to the current climatic conditions.

South Lebanon

- To support access to hard-to-reach areas in south Lebanon, convoys that consist of food and lifesaving assistance were coordinated with WFP and the Logistics Cluster. This week's planned movements include a convoy on Friday 12 June to Qlaya, a convoy to Tyre on Tuesday 16 June, and a convoy to Hasbaya on Thursday 18 June.
