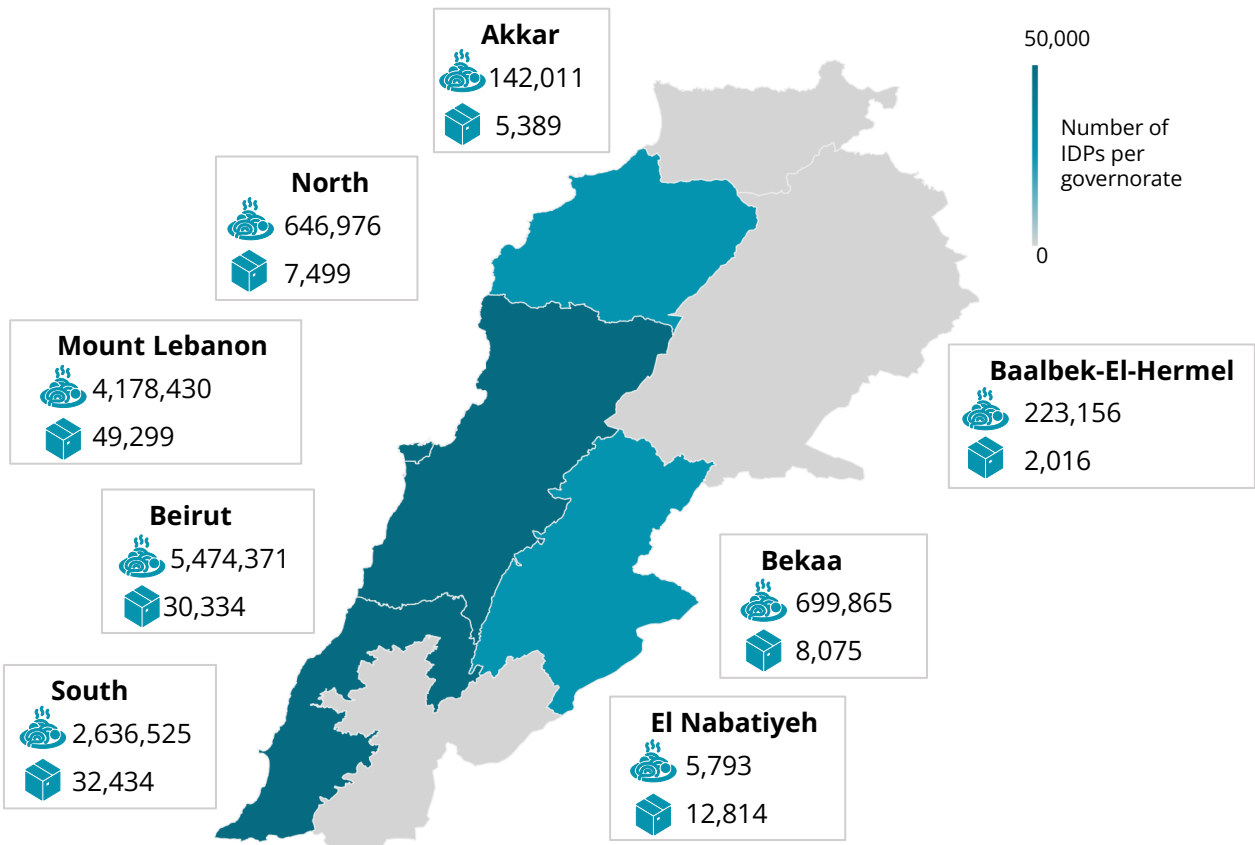

The map below shows the cumulative distribution of hot and cold meals, as well as ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance, across the different governorates.



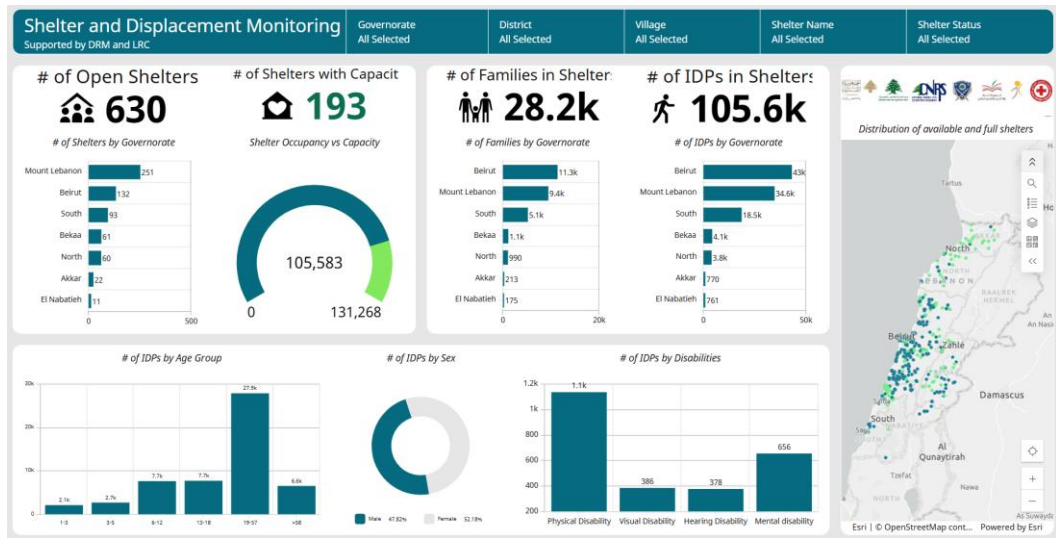
NEEDS OVERVIEW

As of 18 June, an estimated 105,600 individuals were accommodated across 630 increasingly congested collective shelters, while many thousands of families continue to reside in informal or open-air settings due to limited capacity.

While some families have made brief visits to their areas of origin to assess housing conditions and the availability of essential services, most have yet to return permanently and continue to reside in their current displacement locations amid ongoing uncertainty. Consequently, humanitarian needs remain significant, collective shelters continue to operate under considerable strain, and displacement levels are expected to remain elevated in the near term, highlighting the severity of current displacement pressures and the urgent need to strengthen and expand humanitarian response efforts.

Regarding outside of shelters response related to displaced people in high need of one-off food assistance through in kind modality, partners are providing food assistance in Beirut and Mount Lebanon in particular support displaced people affected and who lost or have damage to their shelters as impact of strikes since escalation started, this is a shock response one off only to this need and ensuring mitigating any overlap with other outside support.

SHELTER RESPONSE OVERVIEW

All collective shelters are currently covered by Food Security Sector partners through the provision of hot meals and ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance.

Key Updates

- 1) To strengthen shelter-based assistance, bread distribution has been scaled up in coordination with the Ministry of Economy and the Union of Bakeries. Food Security Sector partners are distributing approximately 12,000 bread bundles daily through 22 bakeries, reaching **199,855** bundles distributed since distributions started in April, integrated within the broader meal response to ensure consistent caloric intake for displaced populations. Discussion this week is ongoing with Union of Bakeries in terms of phase 2 of bread distribution of donations are confirmed.
- 2) The Flash Appeal is published, revised March to August 2026 to address escalating humanitarian needs across Lebanon. Under this framework, the FSA Sector requires USD 120.7 million to target 1.0 million people facing acute food insecurity. Planned assistance includes prepared meals, ready-to-eat rations, food parcels, and where feasible, cash or voucher support, alongside emergency agricultural livelihood interventions. The response prioritizes displaced populations, households in hard-to-reach areas, and conflict-affected farmers and rural communities and inside/outside shelters affected displaced people. - 3) To reinforce ongoing emergency response efforts, the Lebanon Humanitarian Fund (LHF) 3rd Reserve Allocation has allocated USD 6 million to the FSA sector, enabling rapid, gap-driven interventions. This allocation will support immediate food assistance as well as emergency agricultural support, ensuring timely delivery in underserved and high-severity locations.
