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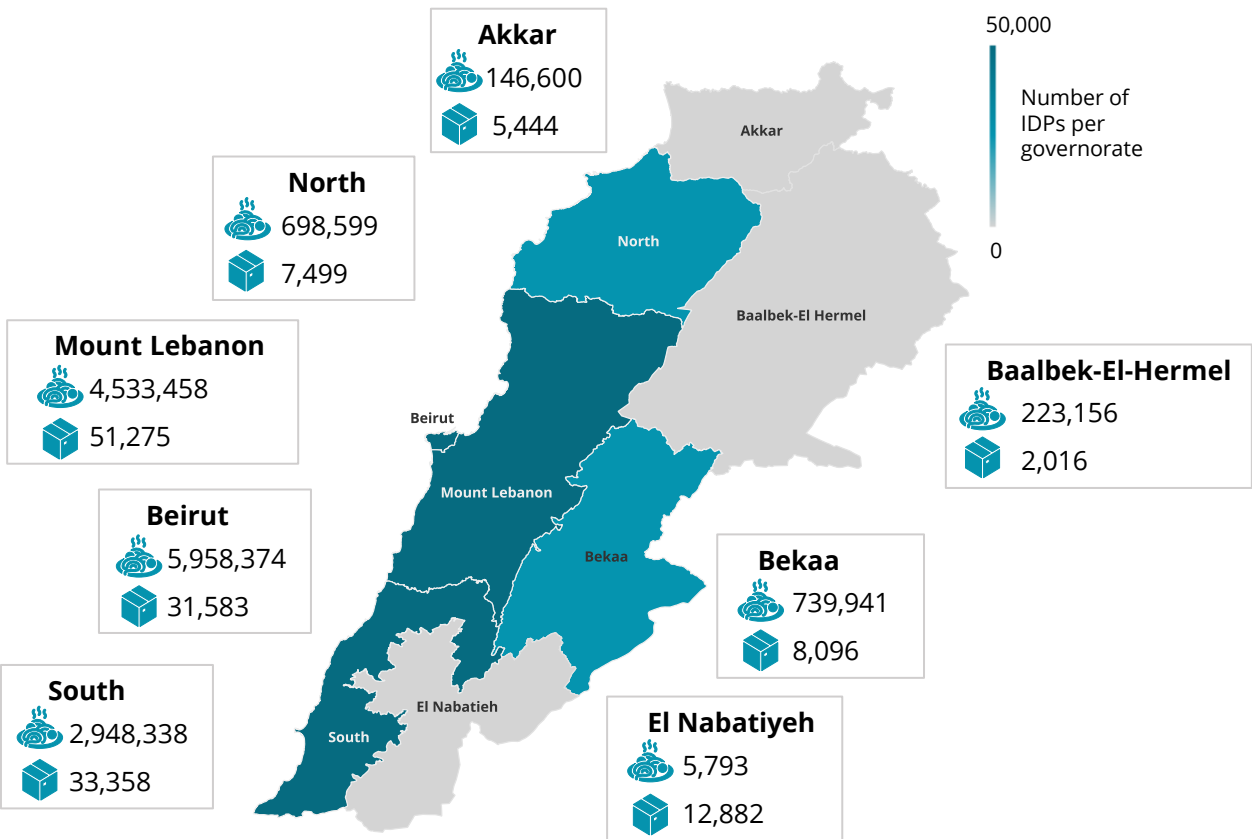

The map below shows the cumulative distribution of hot and cold meals, as well as ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance, across the different governorates.



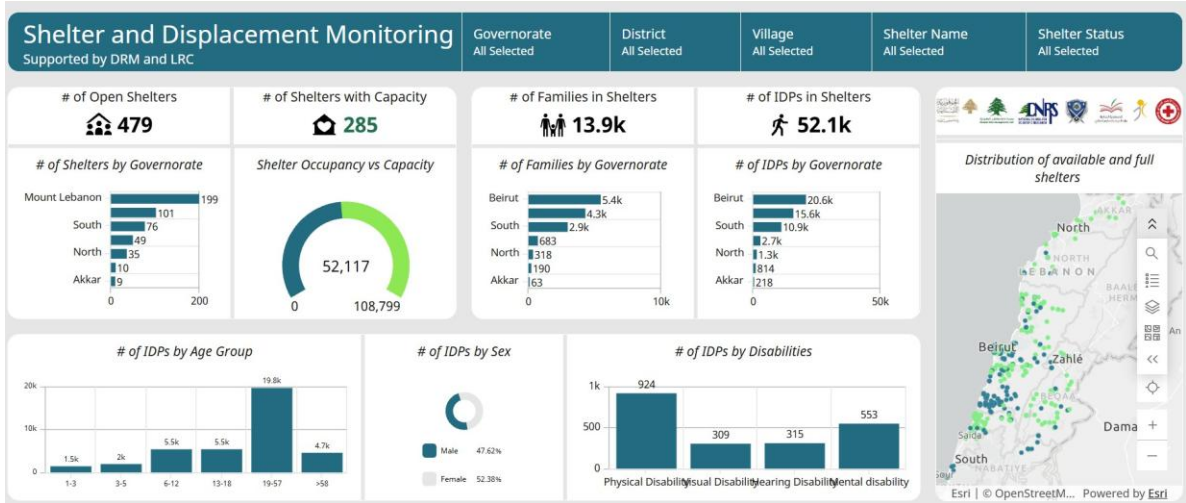

As of 29 June, 704,445 people remained displaced across Lebanon, reflecting a 17 per cent reduction since 17 June. Displacement continues to be concentrated in a limited number of locations, with 91 per cent of displaced populations originating from the districts of Nabatieh, Bint Jbeil, Marjaayoun, Sour, and Baabda.

479 collective shelters were hosting approximately 52,100 individuals on 2 July, down from 531 shelters accommodating around 61,000 people on 25 June. This downward trend is expected to continue as additional shelter sites close. Returns have increased, particularly in South and Nabatieh governorates, yet remained limited as the security situation remains fragile and destruction of housing and infrastructure hinder safe return. A number of shelters primarily in southern Lebanon and some other areas are expected to remain operational to accommodate families whose homes have been damaged or destroyed and who are therefore unable to return.

Despite improving security conditions, widespread housing damage, disrupted services, and economic hardship continue to hinder safe and sustainable returns. Many families remain unable to fully return despite declining displacement levels. Food assistance needs remain significant, as reduced purchasing power, loss of income, and rising debt drive reliance on negative coping strategies, including reduced food consumption and credit purchases. At the same time, returnees face growing needs, particularly in southern areas affected by infrastructure damage and limited access to services and livelihoods. Continued flexible food assistance remains essential during this transition period.

SHELTER RESPONSE OVERVIEW

All collective shelters are currently covered by Food Security Sector partners through the provision of hot meals and ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance.

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## Key Updates

### Regional Updates

#### North and Akkar

- Returns continue to reduce shelter occupancy, with 10 shelters remaining operational in Akkar (down from 23) and 48 of 61 shelters still active in the North. A total of 2,117 IDPs (532 families) remain in shelters across the North, alongside 271 IDPs (77 families) in Akkar.
- Food assistance continues in all active shelters through daily meals while a new round of Ready-to-Eat (RTE) assistance was distributed to all shelter residents this week.

#### Bekaa and Baalbek-Hermel

- Shelters in Bekaa continue to receive daily hot meals, complemented by ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance. In Baalbek-El Hermel, the remaining shelter is currently supported through RTE distributions only, pending the identification of a partner to provide hot meals.
- Funding shortfalls have led to the suspension of some meal services; however, RTEs are being provided to ensure uninterrupted food assistance.

#### Beirut and Mount Lebanon

- Returns from collective shelters continue, with 30,528 people (61 per cent) departing shelters in Beirut and 32,000 people (72 per cent) leaving shelters in Mount Lebanon. As a result, 48 shelters have closed in Beirut and 92 in Mount Lebanon, reflecting the gradual reduction in displacement. However, 32,162 individuals remain in collective accommodation across both governorates, many of whom continue to require food assistance and support to meet their essential needs.
- Monitoring remains challenging as many families use shelters as temporary accommodation while pursuing livelihood opportunities elsewhere.

#### South Lebanon

- South Lebanon: Since the ceasefire, 17,407 displaced individuals have departed collective shelters, representing 59 per cent of the shelter population, while approximately 10,570 people remain accommodated in shelters across the South.
- To sustain access to vulnerable communities in hard-to-reach areas of southern Lebanon, food assistance and other critical relief supplies continue to be delivered through coordinated humanitarian convoys led by WFP and the Logistics Cluster. Planned movements for the reporting period included a convoy to Rmeich on 30 June and a convoy to Hasbaya on 2 July, supporting the timely delivery of life-saving assistance to affected populations.
