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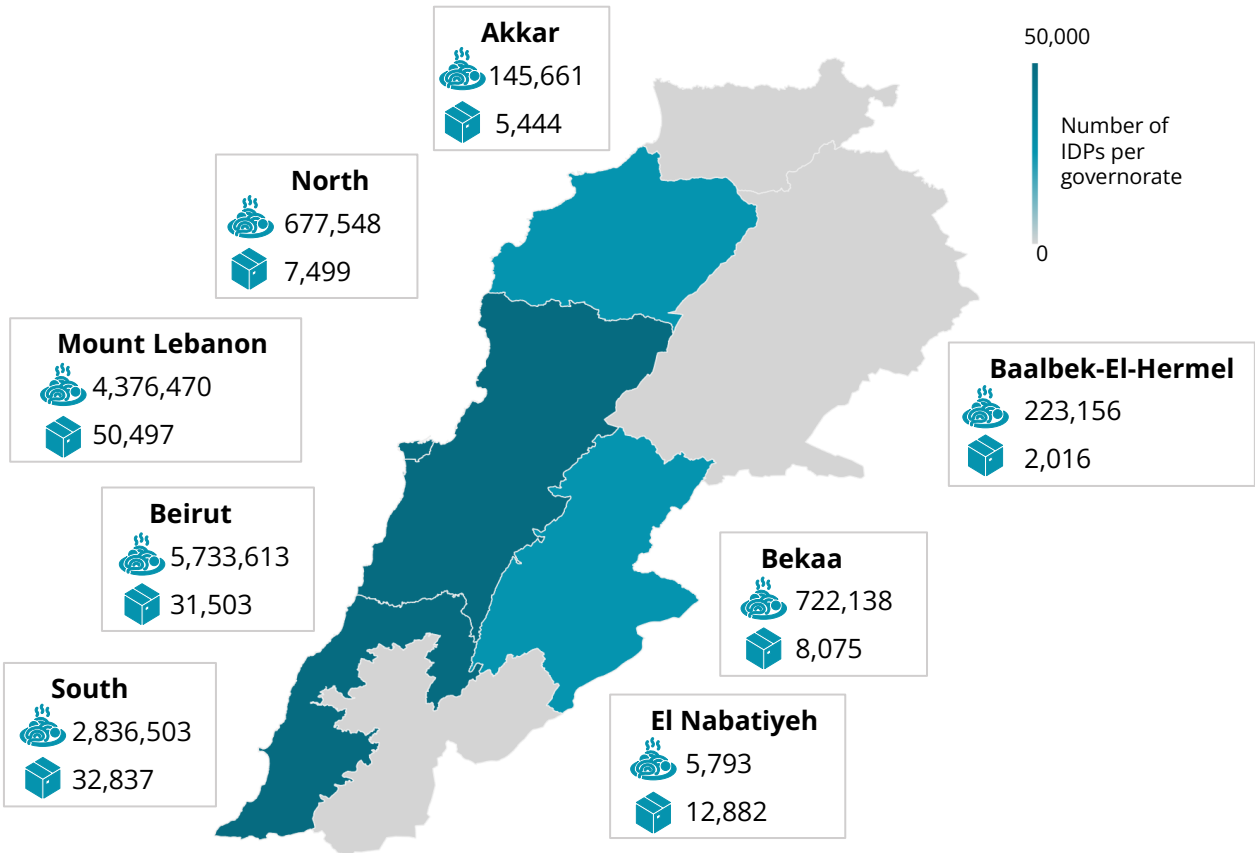

The map below shows the cumulative distribution of hot and cold meals, as well as ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance, across the different governorates.



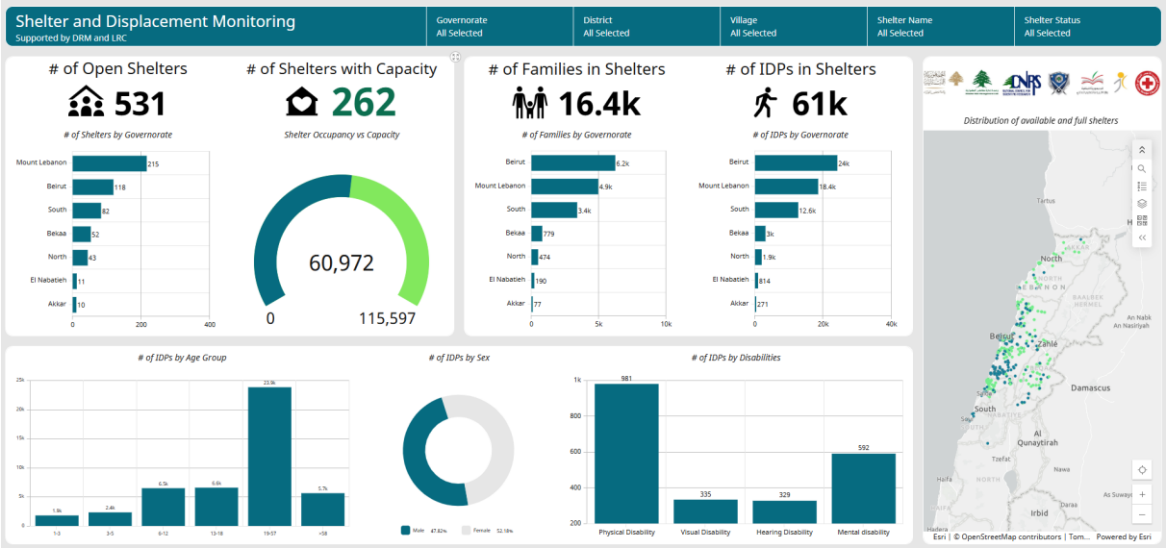

Following the 20 June ceasefire announcement, return movements towards Southern Lebanon accelerated, driving a significant reduction in displacement levels. Between 14 and 24 June, the number of IDPs accommodated in collective shelters decreased by nearly half, from 134,946 to 71,458 individuals (-47 per cent). Most significant reductions occurred in Beirut and Mount Lebanon: Beirut decreased from 50,229 to 27,472 IDPs (-22,757; -45%) and Mount Lebanon from 44,647 to 23,643 IDPs (-21,004; -47%), accounting for almost 70 per cent of the national decrease.

The sustained decline reflects increasing returns following the ceasefire, with shelter populations now at their lowest levels since the escalation began on 14 June, indicating a continued shift from displacement toward return, while monitoring remains essential given the fragile security environment

Despite improving security conditions, widespread housing damage, disrupted services, and economic hardship continue to hinder safe and sustainable returns. Many families remain unable to fully return despite declining displacement levels. Food assistance needs remain significant, as reduced purchasing power, loss of income, and rising debt drive reliance on negative coping strategies, including reduced food consumption and credit purchases. At the same time, returnees face growing needs, particularly in southern areas affected by infrastructure damage and limited access to services and livelihoods. Continued flexible food assistance remains essential during this transition period.

SHELTER RESPONSE OVERVIEW

All collective shelters are currently covered by Food Security Sector partners through the provision of hot meals and ready-to-eat (RTE) food assistance.

Key Updates

Regional Updates

North and Akkar

- Returns continue to reduce shelter occupancy, with 10 shelters remaining operational in Akkar (down from 23) and 48 of 61 shelters still active in the North. A total of 2,117 IDPs (532 families) remain in shelters across the North, alongside 271 IDPs (77 families) in Akkar.
- Food assistance continues in all active shelters through daily meals while a new round of Ready-to-Eat (RTE) assistance was distributed to all shelter residents this week.

Bekaa and Baalbek-Hermel

- Population movements remain fluid, with an estimated 3,309 IDPs (863 households) remaining in Bekaa. Shelter occupancy continues to decline, particularly in Zahle and West Bekaa, although daily population fluctuations continue to pose verification challenges.
- All active shelters receive regular food assistance, including hot and cold meals, bread, and breakfast.

Beirut and Mount Lebanon

- Shelter populations continue to decline. In Mount Lebanon, over 24,000 IDPs have left shelters and 43 shelters have closed, leaving 20,579 IDPs. In Beirut, over 22,000 IDPs have departed, and 10 shelters have closed, with 27,472 IDPs remaining.
- Monitoring remains challenging as many families use shelters as temporary accommodation while pursuing livelihood opportunities elsewhere.
- Food assistance outside collective shelters has reached 25,000 IDPs in Beirut, while distributions targeting 30,000 IDPs are ongoing in Mount Lebanon.

South Lebanon

- In Saida and Jezzine, 14,205 IDPs have left shelters (42 per cent of the original shelter population), while populations in Tyre and Nabatiyeh remain stable. Approximately 15,000 IDPs remain in shelters across the South. Food needs remain significant, with all active shelters receiving hot meals and RTE distributions planned for selected shelters.
- Humanitarian convoys coordinated with WFP and the Logistics Cluster continue to support access to hard-to-reach areas. On 23 June, Convoy 30 to Tyre delivered 1,500 mixed rations and 1,500 light RTE rations, reaching 1,500 households (6,000 individuals). On 25 June, Convoy 31 to Qlayaa (Marjaayoun) delivered 1,080 mixed rations and 945 bags of fortified wheat flour, assisting 1,080 households (4,320 individuals).
